

Cookie policy

Wolters Kluwer Belgium nv (referred to hereinafter as “Wolters Kluwer”) uses cookies to improve the user experience (e.g. remembering the preferred language) and for collecting web statistics about visitors to our websites.

What are cookies?

A cookie is a text file that a website’s server stores in the browser of your computer or on your mobile device when you visit the website. The cookie contains a unique code that allows your browser to be recognised during a visit to a website (a “session” cookie) or during later, repeated visits (a “persistent” cookie). Cookies can be set by the server of the website you are visiting or by this website’s partners. The website’s server can only read cookies that it has set; it does not have access to other information that is stored on your computer or mobile device. Cookies are saved in your browser’s folder on your computer or mobile device. The contents of a cookie are usually the name of the server that set the cookie, an expiry date and a unique numeric code.

Cookies generally make the interaction between the visitor and the website easier and faster, and help the user to navigate between the various components of a website. Cookies can also be used to make the contents of a website or the ads displayed on a website more relevant for the visitor, and to adapt these to the visitor’s personal tastes and needs.

No personal data

A cookie consists of a (unique) number or value. It does not contain any personal data.

What cookies does Wolters Kluwer use?

You can configure your browser so that you get a warning that a cookie is being set, or configure it so that cookies cannot be set at all - but you will not be able to use all of the site’s possibilities if you do so. You can also indicate whether or not you allow the website to set tracking cookies. You can change your decision at any time.

Wolters Kluwer uses the following cookies:

1. Required cookies

These cookies are essential for visiting our websites and using certain components of these websites. For example, these cookies allow you to navigate between the various components of the website or fill in a form. If you refuse these cookies, certain components of the website will either not work or not work properly.

2. Functional cookies

Functional cookies are the cookies that make the operation of our websites easier and more user-friendly, and ensure that you enjoy a more tailored browsing experience. For example, these cookies are the ones that save your preferences in a certain location.

3. Performance cookies

This website makes use of Google Analytics. Cookies are used to gather information about how visitors use our websites with the purpose of improving the content of our websites, fine-tuning them further to visitors' wishes and increasing the user-friendliness of our websites. For example, there is a cookie that helps us count the number of unique visitors and a cookie that records which pages are the most popular.

4. Third-party cookies

The website also contains elements from other, third parties, such as video services, social media buttons or ads.

Refusing cookies
